Bryan S. Wright, Ph.D., is a pianist and musicologist specializing in ragtime and early jazz piano styles. With his wife, Yuko, he has performed and lectured on ragtime across the United States and abroad and released two full-length solo CDs, Syncopated Musings and Breakin' Notes. He is founder and executive producer of Rivermont Records, a Grammy-nominated label specializing in ragtime and early jazz. Bryan holds degrees in historical musicology from the College of William and Mary and the University of Pittsburgh, where he is presently an instructor.

Coming on April 21, 2024 Dave Posmontier's Philly Stomp!

Philly Stomp! is authentic New Orleans swinging jazz like you heard from the Twenties right up to today on Basin and Bourbon Streets and in the French Quarter. Philly Stomp! will bring your audience the sounds of New Orleans with a six piece ensemble playing traditional vintage New Orleans jazz classics dating back to the turn of the 20th century. Among the repertoire are several arrangements by noted bassist and band leader, Ed Wise, a mainstay of the New Orleans music scene.

Dave Posmontier has been playing piano since the age of 7 and professionally for the past 50 years. A pianist, organist, composer, arranger and teacher, he has performed and recorded with many jazz artists including Christian McBride, James Moody, Chris Potter, John Swana, Mike Richmond, Larry McKenna, Grover Washington Jr., David "Fathead" Newman, and Johnny Hartman. Dave's 2010 CD, Posterity features his original compositions as well as some well-known standards, and he recently released a live acoustic trio CD, Deep Pockets. In celebration of its 100th birthday in 2007, the renowned Settlement Music School honored 100 alumni who have made a difference in the world of music. Dave and his brother Rich have been chosen to receive this honor.

Charly Salinger has been the principal clarinetist with the Delaware Symphony Orchestra since 1978. He is also a member of the Delaware Symphony Woodwind Quintet, Opera Delaware, Princeton Opera Theater Orchestra, the Pennsy Pops, and the Philly Pops. In 1999, Mr. Salinger won the position of principal clarinet in the Pennsylvania Ballet Orchestra. Charly has also played with the Houston Opera Company, the Philadelphia Lyric Opera Company, the Allentown and Lancaster Symphonies and the Princeton Chamber Orchestra. In addition to performing with classical groups, Mr. Salinger also free-lances with several Jazz, Dixieland, Pop, and Klezmer bands.

Trombonist **Fred Scott** has participated in a wide range of musical experiences. After graduating from the Philadelphia Musical Academy, he toured the US, Europe and Japan with the Glenn Miller Orchestra. He later went on to play at the legendary Latin Casino backing up performers including Frank Sinatra, Liza Minelli, Sammy Davis, Jr., Tony Bennett, Nancy Wilson and Johnny Mathis. His Broadway show credits include the initial run of "Sophisticated Ladies" with the Duke Ellington Orchestra. He has also performed with Henry Mancini, Nelson Riddle, Peter Nero, The Harry James Orchestra and The Phil Woods Big Band. He is currently on the faculty of the University of the Arts in Philadelphia.

Grant MacAvoy has been active nationally for the past twenty-five years. His jazz credits include

performances and recordings with George Benson, Bob James, Arthur Prysock, Lionel Hampton and Michel Legrand. In the world of pop music, he has recorded with Diana Ross, Sister Sledge, The Miracles, Barry White, and Sergio Mendes. On Broadway, drumming for Marvin Hamlish and Andrea McArdle have been a highlight. Grant is currently residing in Philadelphia, performing, producing and teaching.

Stan Slotter has been active on the Philadelphia music scene for many years. Trained as a classical player both on trumpet and on flute, Stan decided early in his career that jazz and popular music were closer to his heart. He began playing professionally at age 15 and has since developed a successful career as a versatile freelance player. His favorite styles include jazz and Latin jazz, salsa, world music, Dixieland, big band, Klezmer and Israeli music. Among Stan's special moments were performances with Cecil Taylor at Carnegie Hall and with Philly Joe Jones at Livingston College. He has recorded Klingon Klezmer, Seamus Egan, Ronnie James and the Jazz Hot Swing Club and others.

David Brodie started playing the electric bass at the age of thirteen and first took on the upright bass at nineteen while enrolled at Berklee College of Music. After a year in Spain, he returned to his native Philadelphia where he quickly joined up with guitarist Jimmy Bruno, with whom he played for the next several years. From that point, his reputation well established, Brodie has enjoyed a busy playing and recording career and has performed with some of the world's greatest jazz musicians including Kurt Rosenwinkel, Chris Potter, Seamus Blake, Steve Wilson, and Randy Brecker while performing regularly with some of Philadelphia's finest such as Larry McKenna, John Swana, and Joanna Pascale.

Jerry Rife's Blue Skies Quartet Danny Tobias Quintet February 18, 2024 Review by Jim McGann

Change happens.

Sometimes it is thrust upon you.

When arriving at HUMC, I fully expected to see Jerry Rife in what was to be a new ensemble for TSJS audiences. However, when entering the church where the concert was going to be, I saw Joe Midiri and his brother Paul on stage conversing with Dan Tobias and Pat Mercuri. What gives? Not long afterward, it was brought to my attention that Jerry Rife had taken ill, and Dan Tobias was going to lead the quartet. As fate would have it, the Midiri brothers were in town and available. I would understate the point a little by stating the problem was solved. Whatever Mr. Rife had planned for the afternoon's festivities is unknown, but with the Blues Skies Quartet, now a quintet, in the form presented on Sunday, I do not know if anyone could have predicted how successful the concert would be.



I have written articles and reviews for Tri-State since 2002, and probably reviewed the Midiris and Dan Tobias, together or in other ensembles, at least fifty times. When these musicians participate in a concert, the results are never less than good. And Pat Mercuri on guitar on banjo, and Pete Reichlin, making a rare appearance on tuba and, even more rare, electric bass, the cliché "the possibilities are endless" applies.

In situations where a last-minute change occurs, the Midiris and Tobias are at their best, at their most relaxed, and most

adventurous. In particular, the interplay between the horns of Tobias and Joe Midiri stood out. As one member aptly described, the concert audience witnessed "a master class" in musical performance. Some examples are on "Wrap Your Troubles In Dreams" where the two horns engaged in an improvised fugue, the Goodmanesque riffs on "I Never Knew," the slightly bickering one note conversation on "Out of Nowhere" to name a few.

And it does not end there... The tunes performed were ones anyone familiar with early Jazz would know. Tunes we reviewers have heard countless times. Yet, Tobias' quintet created new subtle changes which displayed the tunes in a new light. There was the gentle intro by Tobias on "I'm Confessin'" backed by a soft Mercuri banjo, the slower-than-usual "Poor Butterfly" with Midiri ending on a high, extended B flat, Tobias experimenting with a water glass mute on "Keepin' Out of Mischief Now."

Pat Mercuri's performance on guitar and banjo was exceptional. The solo "A Little Love, A Little Kiss," based on the Eddie Lang recording, his duet with Tobias on "A Nightingale Sang In Berkeley Square" was beautiful. However, I walked away from this concert remembering his fiery, driving banjo on "Shine" and "At The Jazz Band Ball."

I concluded last month's review with a reference from D. Russell Connor, about what makes a great jazz recording. He summarized it was the quality of musicians, and good tunes, and concluding with "it just came out that way." ¹ A change of personnel could have spelled doom in other situations, but in the hands of Danny Tobias and the Midiris, great jazz did come out that way on this February afternoon for TSJS.
